Dr Adam Brown is retired. He is British, and taught in New Zealand for 16 years. He holds a PhD in language from the University of Edinburgh, and has taught at tertiary institutions in the UK, Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore. Before retirement, he was Head of Business and Director of Research at Auckland Institute of Studies. His research covers various topics within linguistics, communication, English language, and English language teaching, especially pronunciation. He has (co-)written and (co-)edited 18 books, 24 book chapters, two monographs and 22 journal articles. 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
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Professor Mohammed Farid



Dr Mohammed Zubair Rizwan is a Research Fellow in the Department of Anatomy, School of Biomedical Sciences at the University of Otago. He was born in Fiji, but grew up in New Zealand. He holds a PhD in Neuroscience from the University of Otago. His research interests are understanding how hormones and the brain play a role in regulating body weight and glucose homeostasis, and he has published 23 peer-reviewed journal articles. Following his PhD, he was awarded the University of Otago Health Sciences Postdoctoral Fellowship, and in early 2021 he was awarded the Health Research Council Project Grant to carry on with his work. He is the Vice President of FIANZ, Chairman of the Otago Muslim Association Inc, and a Muslim Chaplain at both the University of Otago and the Otago Corrections Facility.

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Dr Mudassir Anwar is a Lecturer at the School of Pharmacy, University of Otago. He holds a PhD in Pharmacy from the University of Otago. He has studied and taught in his native Pakistan, Malaysia and the UAE. His research interests include the quality use of medicines; patient and public understanding of, and responses to, different diseases and treatments; and extension of the pharmacist role. He has had 28 articles published. He recently completed a Health Research Council-funded project looking at Muslim refugee access to primary healthcare services in Aotearoa.

He has served on several committees within the University and the wider scientific community. He is an elected member of the Senate of the University of Auckland, and Associate Editor of *Frontiers in Chemistry* and Editorial Board member of *Biomedicines*.


